Comprehensive account management is built-in too including the ability to place and renew holds, view their fines and fees, and for families, members can link together digital library cards to easily manage multiple accounts.

Partner Sharing Group

The Partners Sharing Group is exploring ways of increasing the availability of new materials to patrons and making hold fulfillment more efficient. Some new items may be marked for "local holds only" before becoming available to readers at all libraries. As we move through this process, we will provide an opportunity for feedback on your experience browsing the collection and placing holds.

Magazines & Newspapers

High County News and the New Yorker are now available digitally with your library card through the Flipster app as well as back issues. We are no longer offering physical copies of these titles. Please go to our website for more information about our digital resources: northvalleylibrary.org/eandabooks.

As our Covid restrictions do not allow patrons to linger and read in the library, we have temporarily changed our magazine circulation policy. You will now be able to check out the most recent issue of a magazine for 14 days. Magazines can also be put on hold. Search by title and limit your search in the sidebar by item format to "magazine or periodical." You may need to press "More" to view all options. Our print subscriptions have lagged for a few months, but will return in March.

For the time being, we have discontinued our subscription to the *Missoulian* and the *Ravalli Republic* due to Covid restrictions.



across the American Southwest at the turn of the twentieth century.




Eden Mine

Can the person Jo loves and trusts most have done this terrible thing?


