Mural Ribbon Cutting November 2, at 5 pm



The MCB Prize is awarded to programs across the state in recognition of their efforts to promote literacy and literature in their

communities. Award-winning programs receive a plaque, a \$1,000 award and have their events promoted by Humanities Montana.

The NVPL Foundation nominated the *Captain Hooked on Books* program, which the Foundation funded for its last few years. The Foundation will use the award to help fund our new early literacy performance, *Montana Mollie's Tales for Tots* on Tuesdays at 10 am.




The Amulet of Samarkand by Jonathan Stroud



If you enjoyed the *Harry Potter* books, you will love this trilogy. These books are set in an alternate-universe England that is divided into two kinds of people: magicians, and commoners. The magicians in the story cannot actually do magic - they study and learn how to summon Djinn (spirits), who carry out their orders. One of the main characters is Nathaniel, a very ambitious 11-year-old. He decides one day that he is smarter than his master, so he summons the Djinni Bartimaeus. Magical shenanigans, disasters, and world-threatening events ensue. Bartimaeus, by the way, happens to be completely hilarious. He is sarcastic and I loved him. 


at 3 pm


Brew beer, wine, mead and much more using wild yeast. This class is an information only class for beginners interested in small batch brewing.


