



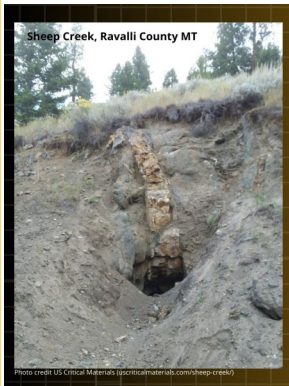

This objective, non-political presentation will cover ways that hard rock mining affects ecosystems, where and how rare earth element mines operate in China and the US, and the radioactive metal thorium and mineral actinolite present in the Sheep Creek ores. Beneficial Bugs & How to Help Them Thursday, June 15 at 6:30pm

The world is running out of insects, and that's bad news for humans.

Research reports that 40%

of insects are in decline globally and nearly a third endangered (*Biological Conservation*, 2019). Learn what insects are "good guys" for gardeners; how earwigs, spiders, and other creepy crawlies help maintain ecological harmony; and what you can do to help the pollinators and garden allies in your own yard or garden. This program also launches a new addition to the NVPL Library of Things: The Pollinator Observation Kit. Check out the kit and contribute valuable data as a citizen scientist!

DIY Bee Baths & Toad Abodes Thursday, June 22 at 6pm

It's thirsty work making honey. Not only do bees need to drink water to stay hydrated, they carry water back to air condition their hive, use it to mix up food for larvae, and to dilute crystallized honey. During this adult craft night, we'll make a safe water source for bees (it's easy to



drown when you're only 5mm tall). You have the option to turn the bottom of your bee bath into a toad abode or a gnome home. All materials provided.

AUDIOBOOKS BY NARRATOR by Karen

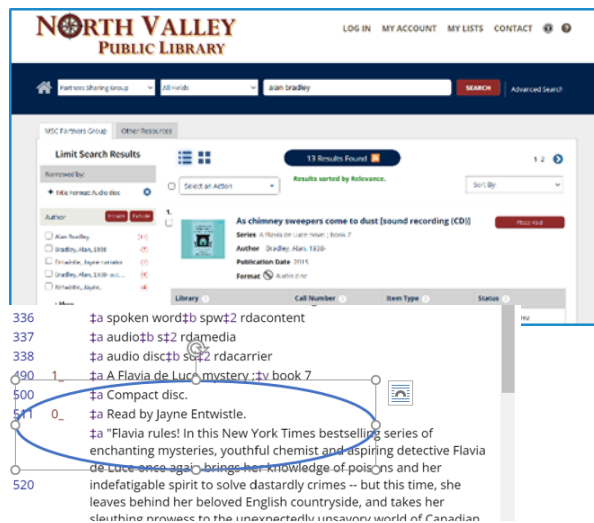
Audiobooks are my “things.” I listen while I am doing dishes, weeding the garden, driving, knitting, weaving, etc. However, if the book is being narrated by a reader with a voice that I am not fond of, I quickly give up. When it is time for a new audiobook, sometimes I search it out by looking for other books that are narrated by the same person. Libby is the easiest to use, but you can search for your favorite narrator using the Montana Catalog as well. The pictures below explain how to find other books by the same reader.

In the library catalog:

Search for the author, title, or series you like. Click on the title of the book, then click on the red box that says “Staff view.”

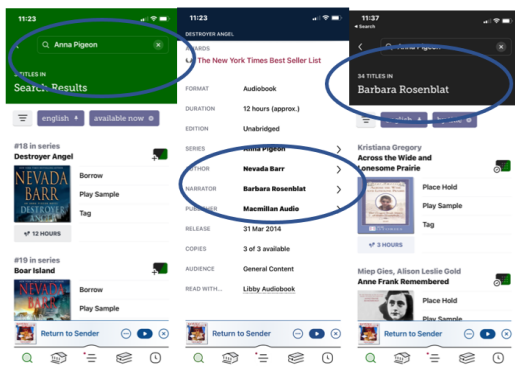
Scroll down until you see the tag 511, and the information will tell you who the book is read by.

You can then type the reader's name in the catalog to see what else he or she has read.



Using the Libby app:

Search for the author, title, or series you like. Click on the image of the book. Scroll to the narrator and click on the name to bring up other books by the same narrator.

Animal Wonders is returning on **Thursday, August 3** with their live animal ambassadors for a **two-session event**.

This is a fun and informative way to learn how different mammals, reptiles, and birds live and eat while seeing animals in person. This is the next best thing to visiting a zoo.

Immediately following, there is an [adult session open only to adults](#) at 6 pm. The adult session is

specially tailored for adults, suitable for an adult audience and not open to children.

Animal Wonders provides homes to displaced exotic animals and non-releasable wildlife and offers educational outreach programs for the public.

Who will we meet this time? It is a surprise! Maybe we will meet Lumi, the Arctic fox, or Atlas, the gray fox, or Cayenne or Chili Pepper, the Patagonian cavies, or Starburst, the gopher snake, or Chopsticks, the Quaker parrot. Whoever we meet, their stories are sure to delight.

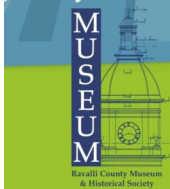
