

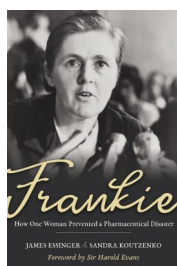
Hot Reads for July



Good Books with Bad Covers

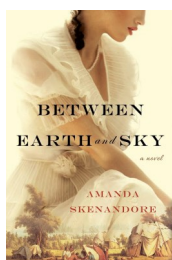
You can't judge a book by its cover.

Some cover artwork does not convey the content of the book well. Here are some books you may have overlooked.



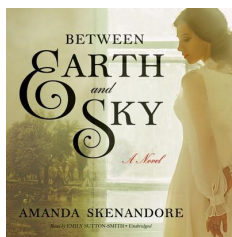
Frankie: How One Woman Prevented a Pharmaceutical Disaster by James Essinger
"On March 8, 1962, pharmacologist Frances ("Frankie") O. Kelsey, a medical reviewer at the FDA, received a most unexpected letter. The drug firm that had pressured her to approve the distribution of a sleeping pill was withdrawing its request. For nearly two years

she had refused to accede—there was not enough evidence to prove the medication was safe. As it turned out, the drug, thalidomide, which was also used to treat morning sickness in pregnancy, had been linked to birth defects in Europe and elsewhere. In the end, it never pervaded the U.S. market. Writers Essinger and Koutzenko unearth the story of Kelsey, who helped prevent a public health tragedy by standing her ground in the name of scientific proof." — Emiliano Rodríguez Mega, *Scientific American*

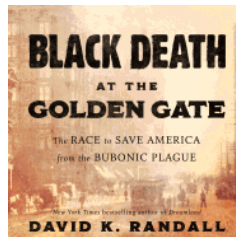
Power Trip: The Story of Energy

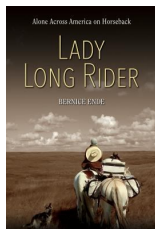


Black Death at the Golden Gate: The Race to Save America from the Bubonic Plague by David Randall

For Chinese immigrant Wong Chut King, surviving in San Francisco meant a life in the shadows. His passing on March 6, 1900, would have been unremarkable if a city health officer hadn't noticed a

swollen black lymph node on his groin—a sign of bubonic plague. Empowered by racist pseudoscience, officials rushed to quarantine Chinatown while doctors examined Wong's tissue for telltale bacteria. If the devastating disease was not contained, San Francisco would become the American epicenter of an outbreak that had already claimed ten million lives worldwide. To local press, railroad barons, and elected officials, such a possibility was inconceivable—or inconvenient. As they mounted a cover-up to obscure the threat, it fell to federal health officer Rupert Blue to save a city that refused to be rescued. In the tradition of Erik Larson and Steven Johnson, bestselling author David K. Randall spins a spellbinding account of Blue's race to understand the disease and contain its spread—the only hope of saving San Francisco, and the nation, from a gruesome fate.

After reading this book I would rate it a five out of five because of how the book teaches the stories of history in a mind-trapping way that makes you never want the book the end.

Early Literacy Tip : Narrate Your Day Out Loud

This is really important, and something many people don't think to do. Everything you do, no matter what you're doing, you should narrate aloud to your baby. For example, "Mommy is emptying the dishwasher right now. See how I take the fork out of the dishwasher and put it in the drawer where it belongs?" Now, depending on the age of your baby, this could be an invitation to help, or simply just a description of what you're doing. By narrating your actions aloud, you are teaching your little one about the daily "programs" in their life. This is how they learn what it means to wash dishes, put on shoes, walk the dogs, etc. This is also is a foolproof way to build their vocabulary exponentially.

These tiny storage devices are shaped like a book with the library's logo on them. They are **8GB** in size and they cost **\$15**. Support the library and save your files.

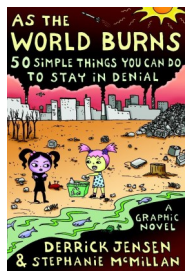

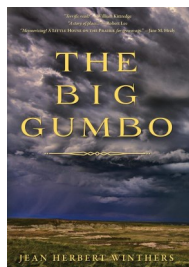
Book Club

Studio Art Quilt Associates, Inc (SAQA) is an international nonprofit organization whose mission is to

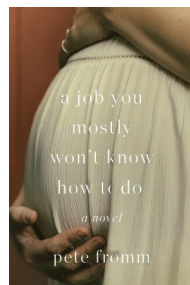
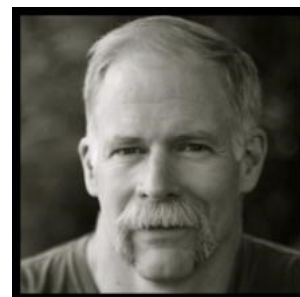
