



Montana Author of the Month: Jim Harrison (1937-2016)

One of America's most versatile and celebrated writers, Mr. Harrison was the prodigious author of over thirty books of poetry, fiction, and nonfiction, including the acclaimed *Legends of the Fall*. His books have been translated into two dozen languages, and in 2007 he was elected to the American Academy of Arts and Letters.

Mr. Harrison's writing is vivid, sometimes violent, and evocatively captures the soul of 20th century rural America.

A native of Michigan, most recently Mr. Harrison spent his summers in the wild countryside near Livingston, MT.

NVPL has a quite a collection of his works in both print and audio book format including *Legends of the Fall*, *The River* Swimmer, In Search of Small Gods, The Raw and the Cooked: adventures of a travelling Gourmand, The Woman Lit by Fireflies, and even more!

10 Years Volunteering!



Annika Recommends:








Mike English has been a student of Eastern disciplines since 2003 and has a background in Tai Chi, Aikido and Shotokan Karate this is an introduction course to
